It is with immense pride and a deep sense of gratitude that I present the Annual Report for K.K. Bhedru Charitable Trust for the fiscal year 2024-25.

As I look back on our journey, I am reminded of its humble beginnings, over two decades of grassroots work, beginning with tutoring a handful of children under a tree in the early 2000s, long before we became a registered organisation in 2014. That simple act of sharing knowledge was born from a conviction that true social change begins at the grassroots. Today, that seed has grown into a movement, touching the lives of thousands across Gujarat.

This year has been one of significant milestones and heartfelt impact. Through Project Sampurna Shiksha, we expanded our reach to over 5,000 children across seven districts, providing not just remedial education but also the confidence to dream of careers as collectors and engineers. We witnessed the transformative power of digital literacy as we empowered over 250 women, like Rekha Ben, to move from fear to financial independence. We celebrated the renewal of purpose with senior citizens like Bhimabhai Patel, who discovered a second inning through our welfare programs.

These achievements were not without challenges. Funding constraints and the logistical hurdles of reaching India's most remote villages are a constant reality. However, these challenges have only reinforced our most important lesson: the invaluable strength of community partnerships and the adaptability of our programs. The trust you, our donors, partners, and volunteers, have placed in us fuels our resolve to do more.

Transparency and honesty have been the cornerstones of our work since day one. As you review this report, you will see that 82.7 paisa of every rupee we spent went directly to the programs that transform lives. This is our promise to you, a commitment to honor your support with integrity and impact.

Together, let us continue to build a future defined by empathy, education, and empowerment. The journey to a Viksit Bharat is long, but with collective action, every step brings us closer.

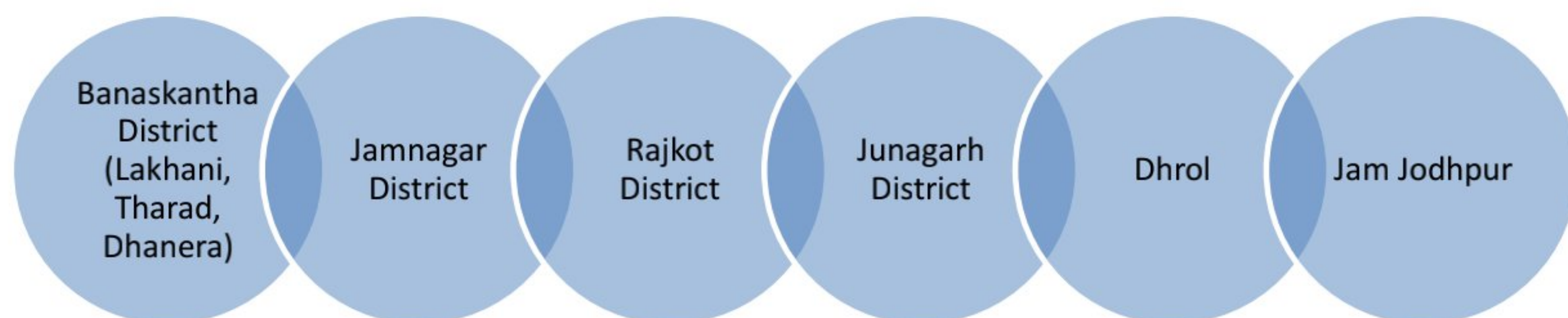
Founding Story

The story of K.K. Bhedru Charitable Trust is not one of sudden inspiration, but of quiet, persistent service spanning over two decades. Long before the Trust was formally registered in 2014, its founder, Mr. Laljibhai Patel, had already begun working at the community level, organizing small educational support groups, helping families in distress, and offering whatever assistance he could to those left behind by the system.

Mr. Laljibhai Patel, a man of modest means but immense vision, believed that education was the only permanent solution to poverty. In the early 2000s, he started by tutoring a handful of children under a tree, providing them not just academic guidance but also the belief that they too could dream beyond their circumstances.

As word spread, so did the need. Families came forward with stories of struggle, children forced into labor, girls married off early, elders neglected, and communities deprived of basic healthcare and clean water. Mr. Patel realized that individual efforts, while heartfelt, were not enough. A structured, scalable, and transparent organization was needed to channel resources, attract partners, and create lasting infrastructure. Thus, in 2014, with the support of like-minded individuals including Mr. Bhadrabhai Patel, Mr. Bharatbhai Chaudhary, and later Mr. Dineshbhai Patel, the K.K. Bhedru Charitable Trust was formally established. The Trust was named to honor the legacy of Chaudhari Kalabhai Khetabhai Bhedaru Bhagat, a reminder that service to humanity is the highest calling.

This structure ensures both stability and scalability. The Trust employs a dedicated team of full-time and part-time staff who manage programs, administration, finance, and field operations. This includes: Program Coordinators, Field Supervisors, Digital Trainers, Administrative Staff, Support Staff (for schools and facilities)

Our greatest strength lies in our army of community volunteers. These are local youth, women leaders, teachers, and compassionate individuals who amplify our reach and ensure last-mile delivery. Active Volunteers - Hundreds of volunteers contribute regularly to feeding programs, educational support, event organization, and awareness campaigns. Community Champions - Local leaders and influencers who mobilize communities and ensure program acceptance. Student Volunteers - Young students from our schools who participate in cleanliness drives, animal welfare activities, and cultural events, learning the value of service early.

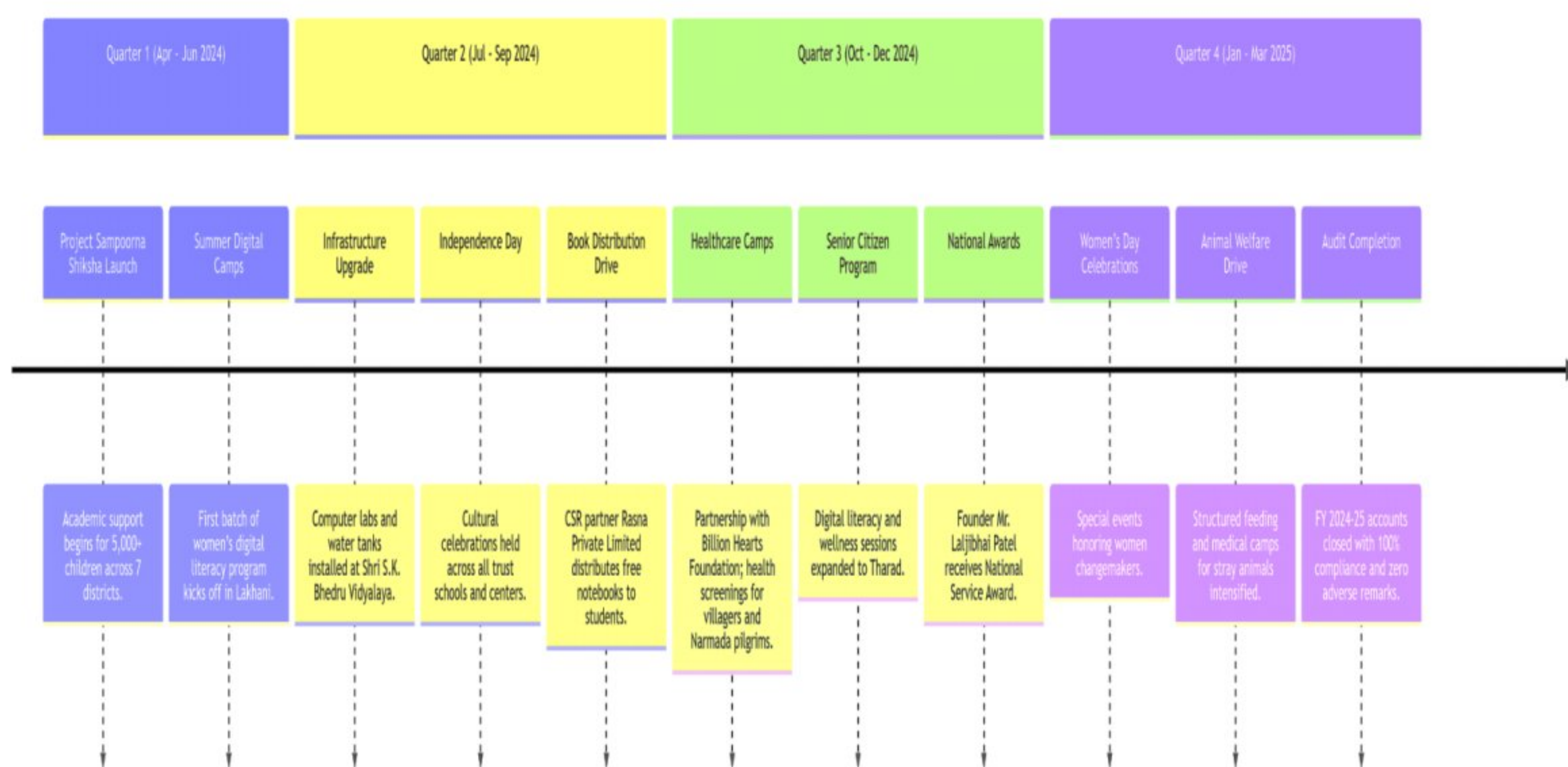

This year, our volunteers regularly engaged in feeding programs and provided basic medical aid to hundreds of stray animals. Educational sessions in schools taught children the value of empathy and responsible pet care. By caring for the most vulnerable beings, we are building a more humane and inclusive society.

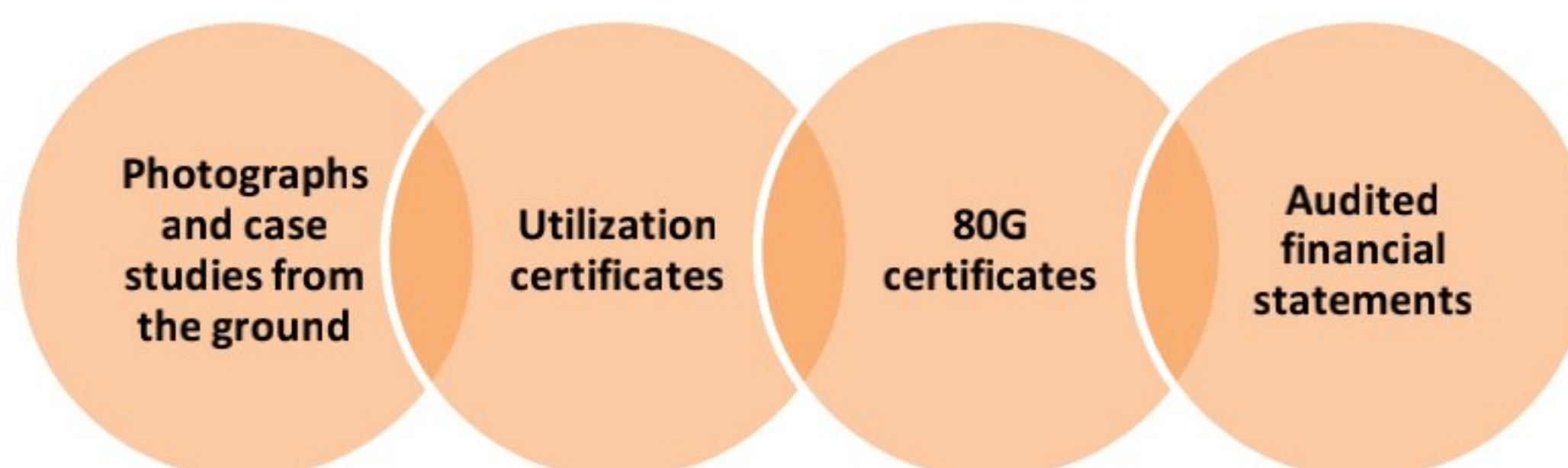
